Joseph Smith Hall - Death Notice

1 October 1916

Sunday morning Joseph Smith Hall one of Springville's honored sons, paused on Life's ancient highway and laid his burdens down, the weary body being no longer able to bear the accumulation burdens of ills which had borne down on it for the last ten months.

His chief afflection seemed to have been rheumatics, with other combinations baffling medical skill.

Joseph **S**mith Hall was born in Springville December 12, 1854 and has since resided here, and as a boy and man has been numbered among the good and desirable citizens being counted as industrious, honest and dependable. Farming was his chief occupations. For many years he was an active member of the first Y.M.M.I.A. organization in Springville.

A wife, four sons and three daughters survive.

Tuesday afternoon a large assemblage met at the Fourth Ward Church for the observance of the last rites.
