Utah Pioneer's Body
Brought From Idaho

SPRINGVILLE, Feb. 19.—William Hall, 81, Springville pioneer and Indian war veteran, died Wednesday at the home of his son, William, at Rexburg, Idaho, of ailments incident to old age.

The body was brought to Springville this morning and taken to the A. Y. Wheeler mortuary.

Mr. Hall is survived by two sons and five daughters, William Hall of Rigby, Idaho; Isaac Hall of Salom, Nev.; Mrs. Viola Roylance of Los Angeles, Mrs. Frank Burt of Lorenzo, Idaho; Mrs. C. A. Houtz of Indianola, Mrs. Alva Gallup and Mrs. Leo Ludlow, both of Los Angeles.

Funeral services will be held in the Springville Fourth ward Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Interment will be in the Evergreen cemetery.

He was in the Black Hawk War. He was just a boy & was sent with a company into Sanpete in 1866. His name is on the roll of honor - he was in actual combat with the Indians.
