Tighearnmas 13th " " , d. abt. 1620. He defeated the Hoberians in 27 battles. In his time, Juchadhan found the first gold mine, and the colors Blue and Green were also invented. He was the first to introduce "Idolatry" into Ireland.

Falach

Eithriall, 11th King of Ireland, d. abt. 1670. He wrote the History of the Gadelian Travels and was called the Irish prophet.

Irial Faidh, 10 " " , d. abt. 1680

Heremon, 2nd " " . In his time, the Picts came from Thrace to Scotland, md. 1. Tea, dau. of Luighaidh, son of Ith.

\*md. 2. Tamar Tephi, Princess of Judah\*(ch. 106)

Milesius of Spain, md. Scota, dau. of Pharaoh Nectanebus. He having brought himself much honor in many battles against the Spaniards, resolved to visit his Royal relations in Scythia. He was soon much favored by their King Riffleoir, and he was made both their Generalissimo and the son-in-law of the King. The jealous King tried to kill Milesius but was killed himself. Milesius with his men went to Egypt. He was much honored and given Scota, dau. of Pharaoh Nectanebus, as his second wife. Later he returned to Spain and ruled for many years. During a famine, he sent his sons to Ireland to find new homes for his people.
