ALPHABETICAL LIST OF PASSENGERS ON THE
MAYFLOWER

- John Alden.** Became one of the prominent men. Came from England as a cooper, married Priscilla Mullins, had eleven children, and died in Duxbury in 1687 at the age of 87.
- Isaac Allerton.** One of the Leyden congregation, and a prominent man in the Colony, assistant Governor and agent to England. After his wife's death, married a daughter of Elder Brewster, and died in New Haven in 1659.
- Mrs. Mary Allerton.** His wife. Died the first winter.
- Bartholomew Allerton.** His son. Returned to England.
- Mary Allerton.** A daughter. Married Elder Thos. Cushman, Robert Cushman's son, and had eight children. She was the last survivor of those who left England in the "Mayflower," and died in 1699 in Plymouth.
- Remember Allerton.** Went to Salem and died there in 1652.
- John Allerton.** (Or Alderton). Probably not related to above, was hired in England as a sailor, and died the first winter.
- John Billington.** Came from London. Was hanged for murder in 1630.
- Mrs. Ellen Billington.** Married again and died in 1650.
- John Billington.** His son. Died before 1630.
- Francis Billington.** A son. Married and had ten children and died in Middleboro in 1684.
- William Bradford.** Was one of the original congregation at Scrooby. He was Governor from April, 1621, until his death in 1657, at the age of 69, every year excepting 1633, 1634, 1636, 1638 and 1644. A few years after his first wife's death he married Alice Southworth and had four children.
- Mrs. Dorothy Bradford.** Drowned in Provincetown Harbor December, 1620.

William Brewster. One of the founders of the Scrooby congregation, was the Elder of the Pilgrim Church until his death in 1643, at the age of 80.

Mrs. Mary Brewster. Died before 1627.

Love Brewster. A son. Died in 1650, leaving four children.

Wrasling Brewster. A son. Died a young man.

Richard Britterige. Died the first winter.

Peter Browne. Married twice, and had two children by each wife. Died in 1633.

William Bутten. The servant of Samuel Fuller. Died at sea.

Robert Carter. A servant of William Mullins. Died the first winter.

John Carver. One of the Leyden congregation who was employed as their agent in England. Was the first Governor of the colony until his death in April, 1621.

Mrs. Katherine Carver. His wife. Died the first summer.

Richard Clarke. Died the first winter.

James Chilton. Died the first winter.

Mrs. James Chilton. Died the first winter.

Mary Chilton. Married John Winslow, a brother of Edward. They had ten children and she died in Boston in 1679.

Francis Cooke. Died in Plymouth in 1663.

John Cooke. His son, lived till 1698. Next to Mary Allerton, the last survivor of the "Mayflower" passengers.

Humility Cooper. A child who came over with Edward Tilley, and was sent back to England.

John Crakston. Died the first winter.

John Crakston. His son. Lost himself in the woods and died from the exposure in 1628.

Edward Dotey. Married and had nine children. Died in Plymouth in 1655.

Francis Eaton. Married twice after the death of his first wife and by the third wife had three children.

Mrs. Sarah Eaton. Died the first winter.

Samuel Eaton. A baby. Married and had six children.
Died in Middleboro in 1684.

——— **Ely.** Hired to remain in the colony a year as a
seaman. Returned to England when time was up.

Thomas English. Died the first winter.

Moses Fletcher. Died the first winter.

Edward Fuller. Died the first year.

Mrs. Edward Fuller. Died the first year.

Samuel Fuller. Their son Married and had nine chil-
dren. Died in Barnstable in 1683.

Samuel Fuller. He was the doctor of the colony. One of
the Leyden congregation. His wife came over later,
and they had three children. He died in 1633.

Richard Gardiner. He became a seaman, and left the
colony. Died elsewhere.

John Goodman. Died the first winter.

William Holbeck. Died the first winter.

John Hooke. A servant boy. Joined the party in Eng-
land. Died the first winter.

Steven Hopkins. Joined the party in England. One of the
leading men. Had nine children. Died in 1644.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hopkins. His wife. Died sometime after
1640.

Constanta Hopkins. A daughter. Married and had twelve
children. Died at Eastham in 1677.

Damaris Hopkins. A daughter. Married. Died in Plym-
outh.

Giles Hopkins. A son. Married and had ten children.
Died in Yarmouth, 1690.

John Howland. One of the Leyden congregation. Served
at times as assistant to the Governor. Married Eliza-
beth Tilley, and had ten children. Died in Plymouth,

John Langemore. Died the first winter.
1673. Baptized in Fen Stanton, England, 1602.

- William Latham.** A boy. Remained here about twenty years. Returned to England, thence to Bahamas. where he starved.

- Mrs. Alice Rigdale.** His wife. Died the first winter.
- Thomas Rogers.** Died the first winter.
- Joseph Rogers.** His son. Married and had eight children. Died in Eastham, 1678.
- Henry Sampson.** A child. Married and had nine children. Died in Duxbury, 1684.
- George Soule.** Married and had nine children. Died in Duxbury, 1680.
- Myles Standish.** Joined the Pilgrims at Leyden. Was a professional soldier and came in charge of military affairs. Two years after death of first wife married again and had numerous children, of whom four lived to maturity. Died in Duxbury, 1656.

Elias Story. Died the first winter.

Edward Thompson. Died in Provincetown Harbor.

Edward Tilley. One of the Leyden congregation. Died the first winter.

Mrs. John Tilley. Died the first winter.

Elizabeth Tilley. Daughter of John Tilley. Married John Howland. Died in 1687.

William Trevor. Hired as seaman for a year. Returned to England when time was up.

John Turner. Died the first winter.

William White. One of the Leyden congregation. Died the first winter.

Mrs. Susannah White. Married Edward Winslow. Died in Marshfield, 1680.

Resolved White. A son, married and had eight children. Died in Salem after 1680.

Richard Warren. Joined the party in England, one of the leading men. His wife, Jane, came over later and they had seven children. He died in 1628.

Roger Wilder. Died the first winter.

Thomas Williams. Died the first winter.

Edward Winslow. Joined the Pilgrims in Leyden and was prominent throughout the formation of the colony. Went as agent back to England in 1623, 1624 and several times later. He was Governor in 1633, 1636 and 1644. He did not return to New England after 1646, but entered the service of Cromwell, and died in 1655 on a trip to the West Indies. After his first wife died he married Susannah White and left two living children.

Mrs. Elizabeth Winslow. His wife. Died the first winter.
Gilbert Winslow. His brother. Stayed here a number of years and then returned to England.

A maid servant of John Carver. Married here, but died in a year or two.

Oceanus Hopkins. Born at sea. Died in 1621.

Peregrine White. Born at Provincetown. Married and had seven children. Died in 1704.

SUSANNA WHITE

GREAT GRAND DAUGHTER OF WILLIAM AND SUSANNA WHITE

WHO CAME OVER ON THE MAYFLOWER IN 1620.

Abraham Ashley (b) and Susanna White were married on September 9, 1703 in Sandwich. (Roch. E.V.R. pg. 17). Susanna (4) was the daughter of Samuel and Rebecca (Greene?) White and the grand daughter of Resolved White who came over on the MAYFLOWER in 1620 with his parents William and Susanna.

William (1) White married Susanna Fuller in Leyden, Holland on Feb. 11, 1612. She was the sister of Samuel and Edward Fuller of the MAYFLOWER. They were married by the Rev. John Robinson. Their first two children died in Leyden in infancy. The third was born at about the time they RESOLVED to seek a new home in the Western World and received his name from that circumstance. He was supposed to have been about six years old at the time of the MAYFLOWER'S arrival. A second son PEREGRINE was born in the cabin of the MAYFLOWER Dec. 7/10, 1620. William White died Feb. 21, 1621 during the "Great Sickness" of the first winter, when nearly half of the MAYFLOWER'S passengers died and were buried on Cole's Hill at night to deceive the Indians. Their bones now lie in the Sarcophagus on the hill opposite Plymouth Rock. On May 12, Susanna (Fuller) White married Edward Winslow whose wife had also died. They had two more children, Elizabeth and Josiah who later became Governor of the Colony. About 1636 the Winslows moved to Green's Harbor (now Marshfield) and lived on the estate called CARESWELL close to the present Historic Winslow House at Careswell and Webster Streets, and here RESOLVED and his brothers and sister grew up. 200 years later the house became even more famous as the home of Daniel Webster. It is now open to the public as a Historic Site.

Our ancestress the first Susanna was therefore the first mother, the first widow; the first bride and the first mother of a native born Governor. She was the gr. gr. gr. gr. gr. gr. grandmother of Thomas Henry Ashley.

RESOLVED WHITE (2nd Gen.)

RESOLVED WHITE married Judith Vassall daughter of William Vassall of Scituate on Nov. 5, 1640. "Mrs. Judith White was a 'mother worthy of her times'. When the Quakers were persecuted in court she could not sit still and hear them denounced, but, (woman that she was, who had been told to sit in silence in the church) arose and sternly rebuked the complainer for his unchristianlike talk; and to her bravery and influence over her husband's half brother, Gov. Josiah Winslow, he refused his signature to the letter sent by the Mass. Bay Colony; and that no worse persecutions are found in the Old Colony Records, she is entitled to the grateful remembrance of her many descendants."

Judith (Vassall) White died in 1670. RESOLVED married 2nd Oct. 5, 1674 at Salem, Abigail (-----) Lord, widow of William of Salem. He removed to Salem and probably died there.

RESOLVED WHITE owned considerable land in Scituate and Marshfield including two houses, one at Buck's Corner and the other at Belle House Neck, the present site of Chief Justice Cushing Park. He was the first owner of the area now called Brant Rock, having been granted all of the land from the Rock south around Brant Rock Point, Blue Fish Rock and up Green River as far as the present dyke. He was the seventh generation grandfather of Thomas Henry Ashley.

Judith Vassall, the wife of RESOLVED WHITE, came from an exceptionally distinguished family originally of the French nobility. Lord DeVassal of Rinart in Normandy had a son who he sent to England "on account of disturbances at home". This John had a son John who achieved great wealth and distinction owning great estates and becoming an alderman of London. At the time of the Spanish Armada he gave two ships to the English fleet and commanded one of them himself in that great English sea victory. By his second wife, Anne Russell, he had two sons William and Samuel, William being the father of Judith, WHO came over first on the ARBELLIA with Governor Winthrop of the Mass. Bay Colony in 1630. William returned to England a month or so later on the LYON and brought back his family on the BLESSING which arrived in New England in 1635. In addition to his wife Anna (King) Vassall he brought Judith 16, Francis 12, John 10, Ann 6, Margaret 2, and Mary 1. Finding the religious views of the Puritans too severe he removed to Scituate in the Plymouth Colony and a tract of 200 acres was laid out to him on the north side of the North River at a place later called Belle House Neck. Judith's brother John built the Craigie House in Cambridge which was occupied by George Washington for some 9 months during the Revolution and later by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. It is now open to the public as the Vassall-Craigie-LONGFELLOW house. Still another historic house is the Adams National Historic Site in Quincy, built by Major Leonard Vassall in 1731 and purchased by John Adams in 1787 just before his election as the first vice president in 1789.

RESOLVED and JUDITH WHITE had 8 children the third of which was Samuel, born Mar. 13, 1646 at Scituate and who married Rebecca (who may have been the daughter of William Greene for whom GreenRiver and Green Harbor are named but this has never been proven.)

SAMUEL WHITE and his wife Rebecca "sat down" as the old records phrase it at Rochester. He was one of the original proprietors who purchased the land in 1679, was on the first list of Freeman in 1684 and on the first board of Selectmen in 1690. The area known as the SIPPICAN purchase included all of the present Rochester, Marion, Mattapoisett and most of Wareham and was purchased from the Pokanoket Sachem, King Phillip. Samuel was a farmer and settled in North Rochester near the Southern end of Sniptuit. He and Rebecca had eight children of whom TWO are our direct ancestors, Susanna who married ABRAHAM ASHLEY and Penelope who married PETER CRAPO. BOTH COUPLES WERE GREAT GREAT GRAND PARENTS OF THOMAS HENRY ASHLEY.

There is much controversy on this section of Fuller

Was the Susanna Fuller that Married William White, and who both came on the Mayflower, the sister of Dr. Samuel and Edward Fuller, and therefore the daughter of Robert Fuller, of Redenhall, England???

In "Genealogy of Some Descendants of Dr. Samuel Fuller of the Mayflower" compiled by William Hyslop Fuller of Palmer, Mass. 1910, he says:

"As the widower of Alice Glascock, it is recorded he was betrothed to Agnes Carpenter March 15, 1613, and the witnesses were her father, Alexander Carpenter, Edward Southworth, William White, Roger Nelson, her sister, Alice Carpenter, and his sister, Anna or Susanna (Fuller) White"

In "Mayflower Desc." Vols 22-23, pg s 65 and 66 are:

The record of Dr. Samuel Fuller in Dutch in the Leyden records gives as one of the witnesses, Willem Hoyt zyn zwager, which is transcribed, as William White his brother-in-law.

Why is it written Willem Hoyt, when on William White's own marriage record for Sat., 11 Feb 1612, his name is written in Dutch as, Willem With, and in Samuel Fuller's marriage record, Agnes White is written as Agnyes Weyt.

Question: Why is White written differently, and could the Willem Hoyt, brother-in-law of Samuel Fuller in his marriage, be someone else with a different name; not William White.

Fuller is written as "Foller" in the Dutch in both William White's marriage record in 1612 and in Samuel Fuller's third marriage record in 1617 (to Bridget Lee). It is written as Fuller in the Dutch in Samuel Fuller's second marriage to Agnes Carpenter in 1613, and as Samuel Folle in the Dutch, in William White's marriage contract.

Question! Why the wide difference in spelling? We see this same thing in all the early New England records here, and even in the English parish records, so I do not think that questioning "En Foller" as Ann Fuller can be of any consequence.

In "Genealogy of Some Descendants of Edward Fuller of the Mayflower", Vol I by William Hyslop Fuller of Palmer, Mass. 1910, is the full will of Robert Fuller of Redenhall, England. This will was written 19 May 1614 and was proved at Stratton, St. Mary on the last day of May A.D. 1614 by ffrances ffuller the widow, and relict and on the 16th June 1614 by Thomas ffuller the executor.

On page 17 of this book, in the will of Robert Fuller, is the mention of a bequest to daughter "Ann ffuller". Why is she still Annffuller to her father if she married William White in Leyden, Holland, 11 Feb 1612???

Was the father unaware of his daughter's marriage when he wrote the will? Seems unlikely.

Did he disapprove of her marrying out of her church? Unlikely, when he left a bequest to both sons, Edward and Samuel; Edward probably still living in England, but out of his church, and Samuel married and living with the Pilgrims and in the Pilgrim church in Leyden.

Question: Who is this Ann ffuller. Try and find her marriage in the marriage records of the parish at Redenhall. This would disprove ence and for all that she is Ann Fuller, William White's wife.

In "Certain Comeovers" by Crapo:
States that Susanna or Anna was sister to Dr. Samuel and Edward Fuller.

In "Genealogy of the White Family from 1607/8 to 1895" by Thomas and Samuel White:
States that Susanna was sister to Dr. Samuel and Edward Fuller.

In "N.E.H. & G. Reg", Vol 53, 1899 and Vol 55, 1901:
Parish records of Redenhall, England. There is no Susanna or Ann Fuller in these records, up to date they searched.

In "N.Y. Genealogical and Biographical Record" Vol 33, pg 171-179 at Springfield, Mass. Library: Re: Fullers of Redenhall, England
No Susanna or Anna Fuller mentioned

In: "Truth About the Pilgrims" by Francis R. Stoddard, considered by the Mayflower Society one of the best and most correct book on the Pilgrims:

pg 97 quote "In "New Light on the Pilgrim Story," it is claimed that William White, who married Dr. Samuel Fuller's sister Susanna, was a son of the distinguished John White, D.D., of Oxford, rector of Barham, near Ipswich, Suffolk, England, and Chaplain to King James the First".

Mr. Stoddard goes on to say, "but I have found nothing to sustain this claim, and it is said that in his will he mentioned his son William who had left his Church and his Country."

Mr. Stoddard is sounding his doubts as to the claim for William White, not for the claim of Susanna being Samuel Fuller's sister.

Same book as above, pg 159:

Mr. Stoddard gives the wife of William White as Susanna (Fuller) White; no more.

French reformed church known as Walloon. She was of Walloon stock, but came to Leyden from England where it is said there was a Walloon church, in the records of which the name of Mahieu was common.

Walloon church records, unnumbered page; admission of Esther Mahieu 1 June 1603. (Leyden records) Hester d after 18 Jun 1666, but before 28 Dec 1675.

Edward Winslow wrote of her in "Hyprocrisie Unmasked" quote "Also the wife of Francis Cooke being a Walloone holds Communion with the church at Plymouth as she came from the French, to this day, by vertue of Communion of Churches." Even though she is called Esther in two instances, she was always known as Hester and is named in her husband's will as such, and they had a dau Hester.

It is not known when Francis Cooke became allied with the Puritans, but he was a Leyden, Holland, resident prior to the arrival there of the band of Puritans who left England in 1609 and settled in Leyden under the pastorship of Mr. Robinson. (Refc refers to them as Puritans, but they were not in the sense of the word).

Francis and his son John, were on the "Speedwell" when it sailed from Delftshaven, July 20, 1620. At Southampton they joined the "MAYFLOWER" but the "Speedwell" began to leak and had to return to London. Francis and John transferred to the "MAYFLOWER" and Francis was the seventeenth signer of the Mayflower Compact.

were arranged, John Cooke had to be born between 1

THE WILL OF SAMUEL FULLER

Samuel Fuller was Deacon of the Church in Leiden and later in Plymouth. He was a physician and surgeon, and his services were in demand in the Massachusetts Bay Colony as well as in Plymouth. In 1629 he was sent to Salem where many of the newly arrived colonists were ill. Mr. Endicott wrote a letter to Gov. Bradford in Plymouth expressing appreciation for Dr. Fuller's services at that time. Debts for these and other services may have gone unpaid, as in his will four years later, Samuel Fuller wrote "Whereas Capt. John Endecott oweth me two pounds of Beaver, I give it to his sonne . . . Whatsoever mr. Roger Williams is indebted to me upon my booke for phisick I freely give him. . ."

In 1633 Plymouth suffered an epidemic, believed to have been smallpox. Bradford wrote in his History, "It pleased the Lord to visite them this year with an infectious fevoure, of which many fell very sicke, and upwards of 20 persons dyed . . . and in the end (after he had much helped others) Samuell Fuller, who was their surgeon and phisition, and had been a great help and comforte unto them; as in his facultie, so otherwise, being a deacon of the church, a man godly, and forward to doe good, being much missed after his death. . ."

The Daughters of Degory Priest.

By E. S. Atwood.

The object of this is to show that there has been an obscuration of the history of the daughters of Degory Priest by a majority of genealogists.

Degory Priest married Sarah Allerton, sister of Isaac Allerton and widow of John Vincent, in Leyden, 1611. He left his wife and children there and came in the "Mayflower," dying at Plymouth very soon after his arrival, January 1, 1621. His widow, November 13, 1621, married again, in Leyden, Godbert Godbertson, a Hollander, who had been admitted to membership in the Pilgrim Church at Leyden. He came to this country in 1623 in the "Ann," bringing his wife Sarah (Degory Priest's widow), and Mary and Sarah Priest, two daughters of Degory Priest (Davis' "Landmarks," Part II., p. 209.) After arrival in this country, in the process of time his name became Anglicized to Cuthbert Cuthbertson.

Genealogists for the most part have stated that Phineas Pratt married Mary, the daughter of Cuthbert Cuthbertson; and that John Coombs married Sarah, the daughter of Cuthbert Cuthbertson. There is no official record of marriages in Plymouth Colony previous to 1643, and the above statement is based upon the following, taken from page 159, vol. 1, of the published Plymouth Records.

It is a report of proceedings before the Governor and assistants, held August 3, 1640, and reads as follows:

"For as much as it appeareth by the testimony of Joshua Pratt, and otherwise, that the two acres of upland lying at Wellingsly Brook, on the north side of the lot given to Godbert Godbertson, were given by the said Godbert Godbertson to John Combe, gent., and Phineas Pratt, in marriage with their wives, his daughters, the court doth confirm the said two acres unto the said John Combe and Phineas Pratt, their heirs and assigns forever."

We know that Phineas Pratt's wife was named Mary, because he united with her in a deed to John Smith of land sold at Charlestown, 1662-3; and that John Coombs' wife was named Sarah, because he also united with her in a deed of land to Gov. Prence.

Of course, this statement is perfectly correct. It omits to say, however, what was the fact, that Sarah and Mary, the wives of John Combe and Phineas Pratt, were Cuthbert Cuthbertson's stepdaughters, and not his own children. This is readily shown as follows:

1st. It is beyond the bounds of probability that Mrs. Cuthbertson would have two Marys and two Sarahs amongst her children. Mary and Sarah were the daughters of Degory Priest.

2nd. This case was tried August 3, 1640, and related to events that had occurred some years previously, and yet Cuthbertson had been married only 18 years, 8 months, and 20 days at this time--not long enough to have married off

two daughters of his own.

Again, a foot-note on page 122, vol. 7, Mass. Historical Collections, 2nd series, says:

"Phineas Pratt (joiner) was in Plymouth about 1623. He removed to Charlestown, and was living there 1677. He married at Plymouth the daughter of Cuthbert Cuthbertson, 1630."

Davis, in his "Ancient Landmarks of Plymouth," page 347, says that in 1632 John Coombs and wife Sarah, daughter of Cuthbert Cuthbertson, sold land to Thomas Prence. As Cuthbertson was married in 1621, it is perfectly evident that these were not his own daughters, but the children of his wife and daughters of Degory Priest.

3rd. The division of cattle, May 22, 1627, gives the name of every man, woman, and child in Plymouth on that date. The grouping is by families. In the 2d lot (that of Isaac Allerton), Cuthbertson's family is shown to consist of himself, his wife Sarah, a son Samuel, and two step-daughters, Mary Priest and Sarah Priest. He had no other daughters.

Finally, we know that Phineas Pratt lived many years in Charlestown, Mass., and died there about 1690. Wyman, in his "Genealogies and Estates of Charlestown," page 771, says that his wife was Mary Priest; and again, on page 773, says that Mary, daughter of Degory Priest of Plymouth, married Phineas Pratt. These are the squarest kind of statements, and fit the facts exactly. None of the other statements made bear sifting. In the face of all the evidence, there cannot be a doubt that Phineas Pratt married

Mary, daughter of Degory Priest; and that John Coombs
married Sarah, the other daughter of Degory Priest.
