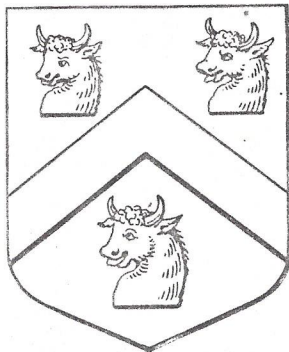
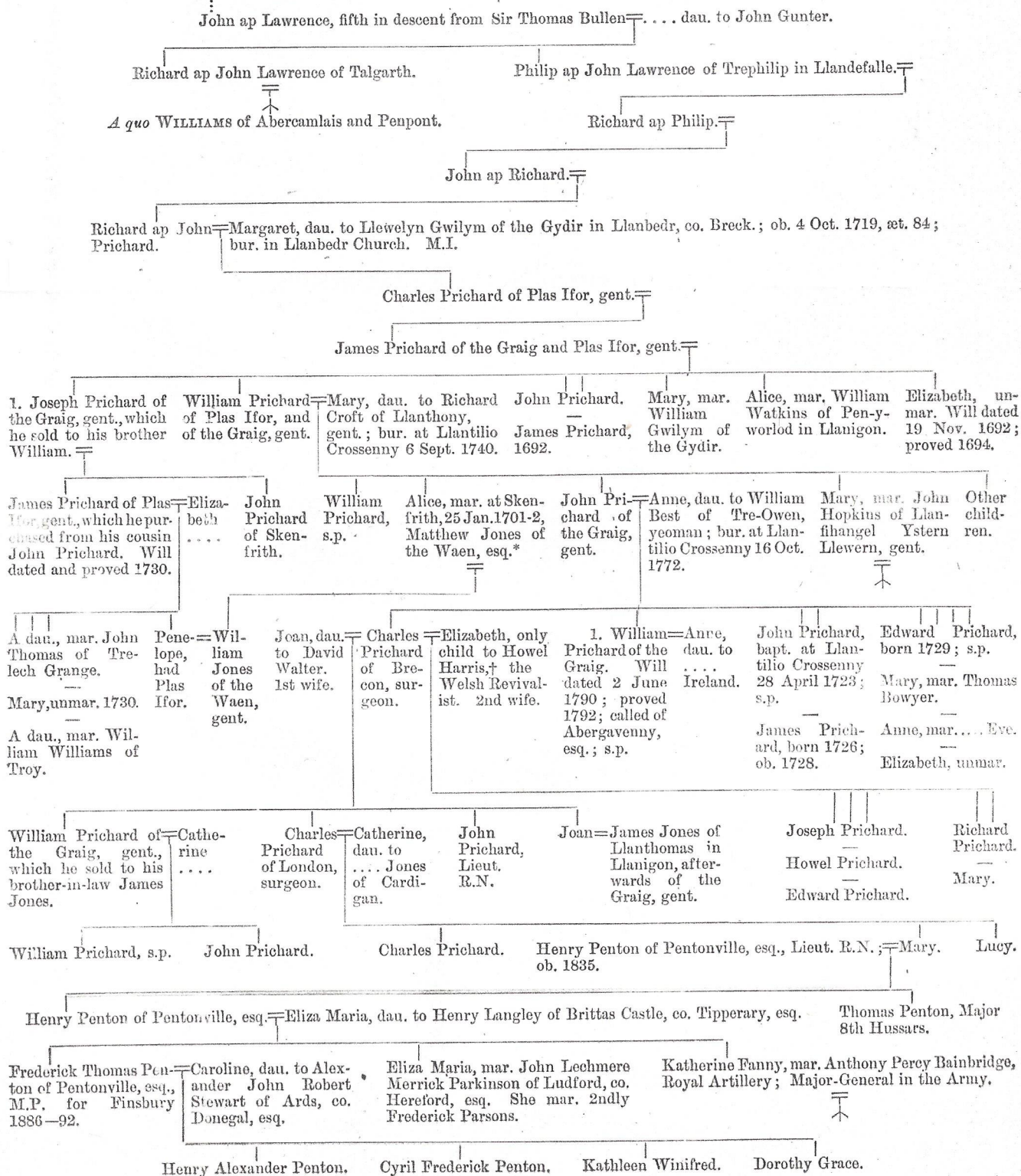


Pedigree of the Family of Prichard of the Graig and Plas Ifor.

# Pritchard

## New Ipswich

The family of Pritchard, Puchard, Puchett, Puchet as it is variously written came early to this Country from Wales and some of them were among the earliest settlers of that part of Old Rowley now called Boyford. Pritchard Pond (now Perleys) on the line between these two towns, well known on the old records, was doubtless near their residence, Paul Pritchard, one of the descendants, was born in 1711 and after having held several offices of honor, and trust in that town, removed to N.C. in 1772. and settled in Mason village on what is now known as the left farm (N.D. 18.) He was one of the most substantial and influential citizens of his day. In the time of the Revolution, he was a conspicuous member of the Committee of Safety, and Correspondence for giving instructions to delegates and representatives for averaging claims for military service for examining the Bills of Rights &c. He contributed largely of his means for the war, and had two sons for in actual service. In 1779 he was chosen representative to the General Court, and for the three last years of his life was one of the Selectmen. He died 1787. at 64. He m. Hannah Perley whose ancestors settled on the border of the same pond as the Pritchards. She was a woman of uncommon energy of body and mind, and could accomplish the ordinary labor of three persons. She had made the subject of midwifery a study, and had considerable practice in her native town, nor did she confine herself to this branch of practice, but became quite celebrated in scrofula, salt rheum, liver Complaint &c. for which her fame was quite extensive. After removing to N.C. she had an extensive practice in that and neighboring towns, She was <sup>at all</sup> ready to answer calls, and allowed no hour and no weather to detain her, and when the roads were so blocked up with snow and the weather so tedious that others would quail at the undertaking, and though unusually corpulent, she would mount the snow shoes and brast the

the storm over hill and dale. This she continued to do until very far advanced in life, to the no small annoyance of the accredited physicians. She survived her husband twenty five years and died 1812. ae 81. their children were 1. Sarah b. 1750. d. 1785. 2. Amos, 3. Jeremiah. 4. Perley. b. 1757. d. 1775. 5. William 6. Sarah b. 1762. m. The sons were all somewhat remarkable as large athletic men, of sound constitution, and capable of accomplishing a large amount of labor. 1. Amos

Pritchard, Amos (son of Paul) b. 1761. lived on the farm north of his father, which was a part of the paternal estate. He m. Anna Andrews of Boyfords. their children were 1. Anna b. 1776. m. Elias Craigie, 2. Perley<sup>12</sup> b. 1778. grad. Dartmouth Coll. studied medicine m. Mrs Stone of Billerica, went to Baltimore & commenced business and is supposed to have been lost on his passage to the West Indies 3. Hannah<sup>13</sup> b. 1780. m. Reuben Holden. 4. Sally<sup>14</sup> b. 1781. m. N. G. Dunn (Gould) 5. Amos<sup>15</sup> b. 1783. soon after the death of his father, m. Jane Dustin & lived in West Brookfield where he died a few years since. Mr. P. was a carpenter and died while building the Hills house. November 23. 1782. ae 31. His wife survived him sixteen years and died on the Campbell place in 1798. ae 50.

Richard, Jeremiah (son of Paul) born 1754. In 1775 he enlisted in Capt Town's company and was at the battle of Bunker Hill; was afterward a Lieut. in the regular army was at the battle of Hubbardston, and all those connected with the taking of Burgoyne and also at the battle of White Plains when he received a wound for which he drew an officer's pension during life. After the war, he married Elizabeth Smith of Hollis<sup>M. H.</sup> when he received

a few years, but returned here, and constructed the tan-  
yard, which he carried on for many years. His resi-  
dence at that time was in the house he built  
near the corner, next south of Mr Peter Clark's  
house. He afterwards removed to the John Melkins  
farm, and built the house now occupied by Dr. J. Gibson  
where he resided some years & then removed to the  
middle of the town to the house next south of the  
Charles Barrett estate and there spent the remainder  
of his days. He was a man of fine personal appear-  
ance, of great energy and enterprise, brave and resolute  
and yet of great dignity and refinement in all  
his manners. He had an unusually good Common  
education, wrote a beautiful hand & served the  
town many years as Clerk, Selectman and  
Representative and in numerous minor capacities  
up to 1800. Chiefly through his efforts, the troop  
of cavalry from this and the neighboring towns  
was formed, and the command which became  
a sort of heir loom in the family was first held  
by him. He died 1813 at 59. His wife lived many  
years afterwards with her son George, their children  
were, 1. Jeremiah, <sup>16</sup> 2. Moses, <sup>17</sup> b. 1789 a trader in Concord  
Mass. for many years Sheriff of Middlesex County,  
3. George W. <sup>18</sup> b. 1792. a trader in Oxford, Vt. where he  
has been one of the leading men, 4. Gilman, <sup>19</sup> a  
merchant in Boston & one of the first engaged in the  
sale of domestic manufactures on commission,  
He was an active member of the Church on Essex St.  
& died of consumption about 1835.

Richard, William (son of Paul) was born Sept 19. 1759.  
He served in the Continental Army as a three year man  
and was in several battles. He afterwards lived on the farm  
of his brother Amos, until about the year 1810. on the  
death of his brother in law Charles Cummings he removed  
to the High Bridge & carried on the saw & grist mill  
there until they were removed to give place to the  
Loughgan factory. In his younger days he was un-  
usually attractive in his person & manners & was highly  
respected through life. He was Captain of the Troop &

was killed instantly by being thrown from his chair  
1855. ae 75. He m. Deidamia, dau Eleazer Cummings  
She was found dead in her room on fire. & from ap-  
pearances, her clothes having taken fire when about to

Richard. John. (son of Paul) b. mar. 25. 1766. m.

family. several of whom still reside in town, he was  
a man of large stature and great strength, he died  
1843 ae 76. His wife died in 1850. His son Francis<sup>27</sup>  
died in 1850. ae 43. an enterprising and successful  
man, enjoying the confidence of his townsmen as a  
man of good sense and sound judgment. His son  
William<sup>28</sup> now owns and resides on the Judge Cham-  
ney farm.

Richard. Benjamin (son of Paul) b. 1769 was a carpenter  
built the saw & grist mills on the south road, & then  
a small cotton mill he also built the house on the  
Mill Village road, east of the Campbell house re-  
mains to Bedford. N. H. & then built another Cotton  
mill & finally another in Boscaum He m. Patty  
Sherwin of Townsend in 1791. Among his children  
were Alanson<sup>29</sup>, who was drowned at Mason Village  
Bernice<sup>30</sup>, Cyrene<sup>31</sup>, Dexter<sup>32</sup>.

Richard, Stephen (son of Paul) b. 1772. m. Polly  
dau of William Start, lived in the tavern house on  
the Village Green where he died in 1802. ae 30. His widow  
afterward married Mr. How and removed to Candan  
Me. when his descendants still reside. Among his children  
are William Start, of Bangor, Mary &c

Richard. Jeremiah (son of Jeremiah) b. 1787. has passed  
a long & active life mostly in town, after the death  
of his father, he resided several years in the family  
mansion & carried on the tannery. He has been

been much engaged in the service of the town as select-  
 man in other capacities. He was, like his father  
 uncle & cousin, Commander of the Troop. He removed  
 to Concord. N. H. about 1816. then to Boston & returned  
 to this town about twenty years since. He m. Nancy  
 Barr. Has a large & most respectable family their  
 children are Sarah Elizabeth, m. Res. Reuben Bates  
 d. 1842. George emigrated to Illinois. Mary Ann. m.  
 Dr. T. H. Cochran Jeremiah merchant in Boston &  
 formerly American Consul in Porto Rico. m. Helen  
 Vile, Henry, resides in Newton, Charles C. resides  
 in Boston. William W. Martha Jane m. Jackson

Pritchard, Roger came from England and settled ad-  
 joining Wolcott territory in the Big Plains near Mark  
 Warner's late residence on the south road from Wood-  
 tick to Waterbury. He was a very stout fearless man & was  
 chosen leader to keep the Indians from committing  
 depredations. He died Sept 19. 1794. ae 76. & was buried  
 in the old burying ground in Waterbury city. children.

Mr. Savage says + Roger Richard was in Springfield as early as 1643, was made freeman in 1648 April 13. that his wife Frances died in 1651 - that he removed in 1653 to Milford where on the 18<sup>th</sup> Decr of that year he married Elizabeth, widow of William Slough & daughter of James Prudden after which he removed thence to New Haven where he died in 1671 -

Alice - supposed to be Rogers daughter at <sup>Springfield</sup> ~~Southern~~ married William Bradlee of New Haven & Joan another daughter married at New Haven on the 1<sup>st</sup> Sept. 1647. John Lumbard of Springfield William Parkehard of Lyme in 1645 & of Ipswich in 1648 - became one of the first settlers of Brookfield. wa

Clerk of the Writs and had sons William, John, Joseph and Samuel, was sergeant of militia and with his son Samuel was killed by Indians Aug-3-1675. His estate was inventoried March 1676 in Nov. 1690. John of Topsfield & Joseph Men of Amesbury convey to their Bro. William the estate at Brookfield which was of their father and Bro. Samuel deceased. William son of the preceding was of Suffield and had two wives named Elizabeth - the third was named Rebecca she outlived him and administered on the estate in 1698. His three children, William born 1684, Elizabeth born 1690, and William again in 1691, all died young.

Benjamin of Milford in 1713 was supposed to be son of Roger the ancestor.

John of Topsfield supposed son of <sup>was a</sup> William Freeman in 1686. Joseph of Milford supposed son of Roger died about 1676. Nathaniel of Springfield supposed son of Roger married Feb 4-1652, Hannah daughter of George Langton, they in 1690, and he married in 1691. Hannah widow of Samuel Davis of Northampton & removed from <sup>Springfield</sup> ~~Northampton~~.

Richard of Yarmouth in 1643 with his wife Ann and his daughter Temper<sup>er</sup> were admitted July 29-1660 to the church at Charlestown she died March 8-1669 at a great age. His will names wife Margery, daughter Hannah wife of Richard Temple.

Hugh of Gloucester 1641-45 removed to Roxbury & by his wife Elinor had Abigail as reads by the town record but by the church record is read Abiel a sons name & baptized Dec-26-1641, Zebediah born Oct. 17-1643 - Phebe & Oct-20-1644 and a child buried May 10-1649 not name returned to Broughton in Denbighshire - Wales about 1660.
